

The <u>winners of the European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards 2024</u> will be celebrated at a highprofile event co-hosted by **Iliana Ivanova**, European Commissioner for Innovation, Research, Culture, Education and Youth, and Prof. Dr. **Hermann Parzinger**, Executive President of Europa Nostra. During the Ceremony, the Grand Prix laureates and the Public Choice Award winner, chosen from among this year's winners and entitled to receive €10,000 each, will be announced.

The European Heritage Awards Ceremony will be held at the Romanian Athenaeum, the most prestigious concert hall in Bucharest, which recently received a <u>European Heritage Label</u> in recognition of its European significance. The Ceremony will be attended by Prof. Dr. **Sergiu Nistor**, Presidential Adviser, **Raluca Turcan**, Minister of Culture of Romania, and Dr. **Nicuşor Dan**, Mayor of Bucharest.

The Ceremony, jointly organised by Europa Nostra and the European Commission, will include live performances by the Romanian symphonic ensemble <u>Violoncellissimo</u>, led by Professor **Marin Cazacu**.







VIOLONCELLISSIMO



<u>Violoncellissimo</u> is one of the most famous Romanian chamber ensembles of the last 15 years and was formed at the initiative of the famous cellist Marin Cazacu, who, together with his current and former students, thus opened a new path in the promotion of music and young talents from Romania. In 2001, the concert given by Violoncellissimo during the George Enescu International Festival was a great success.

Seven years later, Violoncellissimo amazed the audience with an unprecedented musical moment, when 60 cellists took the stage of the Romanian Athenaeum - "a concert worthy of the record book", as the press wrote at the time. On May 26, 2013, Marin Cazacu took the stage of the Romanian Athenaeum again, this time in an extraordinary concert with 100 cellists.

In recent years, the Violoncellissimo ensemble has performed concerts at important cultural events in Romania and abroad, among which it is possible to mention: the Concert on the occasion of the 140th anniversary of the birth of Constantin Brâncusi, National Culture Day, UNITER Awards Gala, Hope Concert and UNESCO 2021.





MARIN CAZACU



Marin Cazacu studied cello at the "Dinu Lipatti" High School of Music in Bucharest and the Ciprian Porumbescu Conservatory, later training in Weimar with Professor Mezö Lászlo.

A laureate of international competitions in Geneva, Markneukirchen, Leipzig, Bologna, and Belgrade, he has been a soloist with the George Enescu Philharmonic since 1983.


He has performed across Europe, Asia, and the Americas with renowned conductors and in prestigious chamber ensembles.

Since 1992, Cazacu has been a professor at the National University of Music in Bucharest.

He founded the Cellissimo quartet and the Violoncellissimo ensemble and established the "Enescu and World Music" International Festival in 1999.

He also founded the Romanian Youth Orchestra and has been awarded several prestigious honours, including the Order of the Star of Italy and the National Order "For Merit."

In 2022, he became the Manager of the George Enescu Philharmonic in Bucharest.





THE ROMANIAN ATHENAEUM

The Romanian Athenaeum is a major Bucharest landmark. It was built by the Romanian Athenaeum Society at the end of the 19th century to host a public library, conferences, classical music concerts, exhibitions, and other cultural-artistic activities as part of its mission to spread culture by any means.

Since 1889, the Athenaeum has been home to the Romanian Philharmonic Society (now the "George Enescu" Philharmonic), founded nearly two decades previously to disseminate musical culture and popularise the masterpieces of classical composers. These cultural societies and their emblematic building are part of the modernisation process in the United Principalities of Romania, declared a Kingdom in 1881 after gaining state independence from the Ottoman Empire at the end of the Russo-Turkish War (1877-1878).

Hosting concerts by great European composers and orchestras, the Romanian Athenaeum has been instrumental in disseminating European classical music since its creation. Since 1958, the Romanian Athenaeum has been hosting one of the world's most important classical music events, the "George Enescu" International Festival and Competition, named in honour of the great Romanian composer.

The Athenaeum also hosts public lectures by Nobel Prize laureates, renowned writers, and professionals from all over Europe, highlighting democracy and European values, and promoting culture and science.



EUROPEAN HERITAGE AWARDS / EUROPA NOSTRA AWARDS

The <u>European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards</u> were launched by the European Commission in 2002 and have been run by Europa Nostra ever since. The Awards have the support of the <u>Creative Europe</u> programme of the European Union.


For 22 years, the Awards have highlighted and disseminated heritage excellence and best practices, encouraged the cross-border exchange of knowledge and connected heritage stakeholders in wider networks. The Awards have brought major benefits to the winners, such as greater (inter)national exposure, follow-on funding and increased visitor numbers. In addition, the Awards have fostered greater care for our shared heritage amongst Europe's citizens. The Awards have therefore been a key tool to promote the multiple values of heritage for Europe's society, economy and environment.




EUROPA NOSTRA

It celebrates and disseminates excellence through the <u>European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra</u> <u>Awards</u>. Europa Nostra actively contributes to the definition and implementation of European strategies and policies related to heritage, through a participatory dialogue with European Institutions and the coordination of the <u>European Heritage Alliance</u>.

Europa Nostra has led the European consortium selected by the European Commission to run the <u>European</u> <u>Heritage Hub</u> pilot project (2023-2025). It is also an official partner of the <u>New European Bauhaus</u> initiative developed by the European Commission, and is a leading European member and supporter of the <u>Climate</u> <u>Heritage Network</u>.


